Module structure Some AEAS modules consist of 2 courses (e.g. AEAS 1103), others of 1 course (e.g. AEAS 2106). You have to attend all parts of an AEAS. Each complete AEAS module awards 6 CP.

ECTS CP Requirements: You need 4 content modules in total (either 4 AEAS modules or 3 AEAS modules + 1 E-module) and the advanced language course of your choice. Make sure to discuss course selection in an individual mentoring session with Ms. Kogler before the start of the lecture period.

Beginning of classes: Language classes level III start from October 7th, all content classes at IN-EAST start from October 14th. Please check the [LSF](#) for short-term changes or exceptions from this rule.

Teaching mode: If not noted differently, all classes take place in person on-site at Duisburg Campus.
